Beans, carrots, tomatoes and basil and more have been encouraged by rainwater and sunshine. What a blessing our youth, adult volunteers and leaders Adam and Julie Conner have begun. A Mission Team from Harrisonburg has created more raised beds and we are on our way to a wonderful supply of good, fresh food.

Jesus was straightforward about our call to feed the hungry and to do all we can to meet basic human needs (see Matthew 25:35-40). Have you had an opportunity to visit our church's Food Pantry that serves guests Monday-Thursday mornings in our church's lowest level? The work of our volunteers offers food of many kinds and respect, gentle listening and a place of acceptance and prayer. Our volunteers have put in place a computerized system and a well-organized approach to food distribution. Jesus is pleased, of that I'm sure!

Disciple's Kitchen is a Soup Kitchen, staffed by a group of ecumenical volunteers who prepare hot food for the poor and hungry... lunches on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays at Second Presbyterian Church and Saturday breakfasts at Basic UMC. This Waynesboro ministry has thrived for 12 years, with 250 volunteers serving over 100,000 meals. There is prayer, hymn singing and table fellowship. Would you like to be a part of the MSUMC Team? Please let Pastor Linda know.

And then there's the food that we eat! Summertime cook-outs are so much fun and we have the most beautiful environment in which to enjoy them. But what exactly are we eating and how does it affect our wellbeing? "The Daniel Plan" by Rev Rick Warren is a 40-day program that looks at health holistically... what we eat, how we fellowship, what we focus upon and how we choose to be part of a community of believers with deep friendships. 


July 7 (Stove Building)

Our next VIM Trip to Paxot 2 is projected to be: March 21-29, 2020. We will have service opportunities for a range of abilities and would warmly welcome youth to join us!

Pastor Linda invites those called to mission in Guatemala to join her for an exploratory visit to Guatemala from November 11
15. Our purpose will be to travel with Guatemala VIM Director Lulu Ramirez and husband Rich to explore new opportunities for service that are less physically demanding than building stoves.

We will visit an orphanage that receives abandoned and handicapped children (including kids from Paxot), the Methodist Retreat Center (which our church in Paxot 2 visits), and Maryknoll Sisters who were present during the Guatemalan civil war. Our goal for our 2020 Mission Team will be to have "two tracks" or two options for service during our week together.

A <u>Benefit Dinner</u> for Guatemala Travel Scholarships is being planned for a Wednesday evening in late October. More information will be forthcoming!

There were a total of 48 children and youth who attended, up by more than 25% over last year. Through our service project, we collected 200 items for the Food Pantry!

I want to offer special thanks to everyone who played a part. We had 24 adults who made the commitment to take part, along with numerous others who supported us through donations and prayers. Thank you all for making a powerful week for the kids.

Safety Awareness

We had a periodic fire safety inspection at church soon, and that prompted thinking about "I wonder if our congregants know..." some of the key elements of inspections that we can have a direct impact upon... Obviously, the more serious issue of not being in compliance with Code, rests with exposing ourselves and others to unnecessary hazards, easily life threatening...that being what the Code is actually all about.

So, from a layman's perspective:

- 1. We must keep open and uncluttered access to all fire extinguishers and to electrical control panels (in other words, nothing is to block access to them).
- 2. Hallways are to remain clear from storage of all materials which could reduce escape in an emergency. (No storage of anything into a hallway beyond the door framework.)
- 3. Surge protector power strips' use are OK, but none may be "daisy chained" (one feeding another).
- 4. Extension cords are OK to be used if they are of adequate gauge wire for a temporary use; they must be removed after each occurrence of use (i.e. not kept in place for the next day use and so on).
- 5. Temporary use of cords must not be beneath runners, carpeting, etc. or present trip hazards.

These are a few items of present and former inspections/observations that nearly all of us can impact, directly or through after-the-fact observation. Let me (or Ed Combs, Judy von Bernuth) know if you see something which needs to be addressed and you are unable to fix yourself.
